Earn clock hours to satisfy the new English Learner Professional Development license requirement through COpilot.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Although the new license requirement only impacts educators endorsed in elementary, math, science, social studies, or English Language Arts, all CEA members are eligible to take the free classes.

B WHAT CLASSES?

Educators affected by the new requirement must demonstrate 45 clock hours of English Learner PD, and we have dozens of classes on COpilot that align to the ELPD standards.

STARTING WHEN?

The new requirement is effective September 1, 2018, so the earliest deadline for any currently licensed educator to meet the ELPD requirement is 2023. The free COpilot classes will open for enrollment on November 12, 2018.

IT ALL **MEANS** WHAT?

Educators endorsed in elemenatry, math, science, social studies, or English Languge Arts must show 45 hours of English Learner PD. The license requirement must be fufilled in the educator's <u>next, new</u> license renewal period. The earliest deadline is September 2023.

Each member is eligible for one free class per school year (\$45 value), which runs from August - July (maximum three free classes).

Free class enrollments open on November 12, 2018 and apply to Spring 2019 classes that start as early as January 7, 2019.

Non-members are eligible for reduced pricing on classes that qualify for the English Learner PD program.

COpilot keep track of free classes and will feature a new "Tracks" section that will help educators easily identify the ELPD classes.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs):

How do I sign up for a COpilot account?

To create a COpilot account, visit www.ceacopilot.org, click Log In and either verify your Association membership or create a guest account. This easy process doesn't take more than 30 seconds!

How much time does a class take?

Most COpilot classes are 15 instructional hours spread over five or six weeks. Students should expect to spend about three hours per week doing class activities.

Can I earn credit, clock hours, and a certificate?

The answer is a resounding "Yes!" Nearly all of the classes on COpilot qualify for graduate credit from Adams State University. All of the classes are eligible for license renewal hours through the Colorado Department of Education. At the conclusion of each class, you will receive a certificate of completion for your records.

Can I get the syllabus for the class before making a decision?

Absolutely! Just email the Director of Learning Services, Casey Kilpatrick (ckilpatrick@coloradoea.org), for that information.

Can my district use COpilot for its professional development?

CEA has worked hard to make sure districts in partnership with the local association can use COpilot to run all of their professional development. We do not charge districts to use the platform. Instead, our requirement is that the district and local association reach an agreement that dictates the school district will pay members who facilitate the classes a fair stipend. How are classes structured?

All of our classes are fully facilitated, which means you'll have a trained CEA member leading you and teachers from across Colorado through the content. Our classes are time-bound so that the facilitation makes sense. Through using this mostly synchronous method, teachers can more easily collaborate with each other, share experiences, and receive coaching as they practice strategies in their classrooms.



Qualifies for English Learner PD Credit

Google Level 2 Certification Training

This course is an expertise certification for an educator who is a super Google user and enthusiast of Google tools in the classroom. This advanced course builds upon concepts from the Fundamentals Training course. Obtaining Google Level 1 certification first is highly recommended.

Educators will engage with course readings and interactive video instruction to further develop their understanding of blended learning and instructional strategies. In addition, teachers will compose three interactive lessons using www.brainitz.com. Enrollment comes with a year-long subscription to Brainitz.

Enhancing Vocabulary Instruction to Improve Academic Success



In this class, participants will explore a structure for vocabulary instruction that inspires students to build more interest in words, engage in deeper processing of meanings and create more vast lexicons. Participants will learn how to design vocabulary instruction by following a format that explicitly introduces the meaning of words and solidifies understanding with thought-provoking and interactive follow-up activities. At the end of the course, participants will create an instructional sequence for introducing and reinforcing new vocabulary while using content from their classroom curriculum.

Understanding the Science of Foundational Reading Skills



Learn how foundational reading skills are an integral part when learning how to read. Apply this knowledge to your classroom whether you are a general education teacher in a primary classroom, teach intervention for struggling readers or are an intermediate or secondary teacher working with students who are facing difficulties with reading proficiency. Teachers will participate in weekly assignments and have the opportunity to collaborate with others. Learn the 'why' behind teaching reading fundamentals and how you can respond to individual student needs appropriately in any setting.

This book study will give English Language and Gen Ed teachers of grades K-12, as well as administrators, counselors, and other school support faculty, the chance to focus on practical applications of EL (English Learner) advocacy research. The course will provide participants opportunities to build empathy and experience a sense of what it feels like to be an EL. Participants will acquire a better feel for how their own classrooms, schools, and districts may advocate and work collaboratively and creatively to increase family involvement, ensure a welcoming environment, and improve instruction and assessment for their EL population. *Course dates: January 5 - February 9; March 29 - May 3*

Students Creating Educational Videos to Enhance the Learning Environment

In this class, educators will learn how to get students to create their own videos in order to share their knowledge with the rest of the class. This will be a great way to get students to collaborate throughout the class period as well as to build the classroom's video library. Educators will be provided articles to read about the various uses of videos. We will then have discussions about how you plan to implement the videos either in your class or website so that students can learn from each other.

Creating an Interactive Schoology Website

You can take attendance and set up a grade book. You can use Schoology as a way to have a blended classroom or to purely house what you've done so that students can check out what they have missed while they were absent. You can archive your class and then copy what you've created for the following year so that you won't have to recreate the wheel.

Over the course of five weeks, we will learn to easily redesign worksheets to incorporate movement, explore the benefits and drawbacks of classroom simulations, give resources for brain breaks, and more!

The book then explores innovative treatment options that can help activate the brains neuroplasticity.

Included in this book study will be practical application of how to use the concepts that the book introduces.



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Planning for Mathematical Discussions with the 5 Practices

This course will prepare teachers to further develop their understanding of planning for facilitating a productive mathematics discussion by participating in a book study of 5 *Practices for Orchestrating Productive Mathematics Discussions.* Participants will begin by setting learning goals and analyzing the cognitive demand level of an upcoming task and anticipating possible student responses. We will discuss monitoring and sequencing student strategies that will be shared with the class. Principles to Actions names "facilitating meaningful mathematical discourse" as a powerful teaching practice where teachers will also engage with helping students gain a shared understanding by comparing and analyzing their approaches, connecting mathematical representations, and engaging in productive struggle. *Course dates: January 13 - February 7; February 17 - March 13 Cost: \$45 (member) or \$145 (non-member) | Available for 1 graduate credit through ASU Facilitator: Kelsey Kempter (Denver Classroom Teachers' Association)*

Developing Emotional Resiliency in the Classroom

Do you observe students who cannot deal with their emotions? Are they in constant struggle with their friends? Do they fall victim to situations frequently? Do you have parents who hover and rescue? If you answered yes to any of these questions, then this course is for you! There is currently a mental health crisis with our youth today and the pressure is on teachers to support our students, but most of us do not know how to. In this course teachers will actively participate in online learning to develop an understanding of emotional resiliency and how to empower students by nurturing those resiliency skills through the use of 4 ingredients. *Course dates: January 13 - February 16*

Learning to Choose, Choosing to Learn

This teacher-friendly guide offers everything you need to help students who are bored, frustrated, or underperforming come alive to learning through the fundamental power of choice. This book study will use the ASCD book Learning to Choose, Choosing to Learn by Mike Anderson.



Teaching English Language Learners Across Content Areas

Have you ever wondered if all of your students are truly "getting it?" This course will look at interventions that can be used in the classroom to support students with the development of these executive functioning skills.

Culturally responsive pedagogy has shown great promise in meeting this need, but many educators still struggle with its implementation. In this book, Zaretta Hammond draws on cutting-edge neuroscience research to offer an innovative approach for designing and implementing brain-compatible culturally responsive instruction.

Participants will be engaged in ensuring a positive school environment that embodies respect and inclusivity. 


